Dear Secretary of State,

The latest revelations in the Times on forced prepayment meters (PPMs) should shame the energy industry, regulators and the Government.

At every point in the long running campaign against forced PPMs, we have been fobbed off with reassurances about best practice, voluntary codes and people trying to wash their hands of responsibility.

The reality is that forcing vulnerable people through a court process is problematic enough, but it resulting in a court-sanctioned warrant for an energy firm to break into a home is barbaric.

We appreciate that in the two cases reported by The Times there has been a resolution, in that Scottish Power says it won't now proceed with the warrants.

However, it shouldn't be up to a national newspaper's investigations team to help vulnerable people avoid being forced onto PPMs.

We're concerned that the checks and systems Scottish Power have in place are not fit for purpose. Given the firm has been making progress towards being granted permission from Ofgem to restart forced PPM installations, we believe this calls into question the whole system the regulator has in place.

The court's response to The Times' reporters was also disappointing - they seem to operate under a cloak of secrecy and apparently refuse to confirm what the listing guidance is, where the pilot programmes are taking place and what the rules for magistrates currently are.

The same old magistrates' practices seem to have continued in these new examples: Distant hearings, nodding through batch applications, not checking for vulnerability and a failure to inform customers that they are due to have their case heard.

No one can be confident of getting justice under the current system.

This scandal must stop here.

The <u>letter</u> you sent to Scottish Power and Ofgem this week is a first step. However, we need you to show further leadership on this issue.

The Government must ban the practice of forced prepayment meters outright through legislation in the House of Commons. Ministers rejected the opportunity to do this during the passage of the Energy Act, but the case for a ban is now even more convincing.

In the meantime, given the doubts around the process, there can be absolutely no way that Ofgem can approve any supplier for a restart of forced prepayment meters this winter. The Government must instruct Ofgem that the current ban - which includes switching of smart meters into PPM mode - must stay in place until at least April 2024.

We would also request that Ofgem now places Scottish Power under heightened monitoring for all aspects of its customer service and for its dealings with vulnerable customers. As a first step, Scottish Power and its subcontractors must be instructed to cancel all warrants it has sought so far and cease any current warrant applications being made.

Of course we share the concerns of energy firms about the levels of household energy debt. This is why there is widespread support for the introduction of a <u>Help to Repay scheme</u> (which we and others have written to you about previously) and why we also back plans for an <u>Emergency Energy Tariff</u> this winter.
