Dear Miatta Fahnbulleh MP and Jonathan Brearley,

We are writing to express urgent concerns about the rollout of the Radio Teleswitch Service (RTS) meter replacement programme and the significant risks it poses to energy consumers, particularly vulnerable households.

Capacity and Rollout Challenges

There is growing evidence that major suppliers will struggle to meet the current RTS meter replacement targets. Installation capacity remains a critical issue, especially in rural and remote areas where engineering resources are limited.

We have requested figures from Ofgem on the scale of the challenge still facing us, but these have not been forthcoming. Based on our members' own conversations with energy suppliers, we estimate that in Scotland alone, tens of thousands of RTS meters are yet to be addressed, leaving many consumers in limbo.

Consumer Uncertainty

Advisers working on the frontline are hearing from households receiving conflicting messages about the status of their RTS meters from suppliers and the risk of service disruption. In some cases, what is said to consumers on the phone or even in letters to households undermines the public information campaign being run by Ofgem.

For example, in the first wave of communication to some customers in London, households had a message that said "you may lose access to normal functioning of your heating and hot water", and then a second message that implies that there's nothing the supplier can do about it right now.

In another case, a major supplier in Scotland told a customer who called up to request a new meter that there was "nothing to worry about."

Many consumers are uncertain about whether their heating and hot water will continue to function, what alternative metering options will be provided, and what financial implications these changes may have.

No Detriment Commitment

There remains a troubling lack of clarity around the so-called "no detriment" commitment. It is unclear whether this promise applies universally or only to those who actively seek support.

Without clear and enforceable protections, there is a risk of significant cost increases for consumers, particularly those who are vulnerable or digitally excluded.

Billing Inconsistencies

We are also concerned by reports of inconsistent billing practices across suppliers, with some consumers being charged double standing charges as a result of their RTS meter configurations. This further undermines trust in the replacement programme and risks pushing more households into financial distress.

We urgently request that Ofgem, Government, devolved administrations, local authorities and the energy industry undertake:

- Clear, coordinated communication to consumers outlining RTS replacement timelines and expectations.
- A detailed, transparent plan to ensure vulnerable consumers are protected throughout the transition.
- Guidance for suppliers to ensure consistent support alongside fair and transparent metering and billing practices.
- Regular, publicly available, updates on the state of play and number of successful transfers to new meters delivered, booked and spare capacity.

End Fuel Poverty Coalition and Energy Action Scotland members are already deeply engaged in Ofgem's RTS activity and will continue to do all they can to raise awareness of the switch off, but time is now running out and urgent action is required.
